

HDA 290 - DENTAL ASSISTANT INTERNSHIP

- Reflect on Michigan Board of Dentistry regulations related to training and identifying victims of human trafficking in health care settings.

Learning How to Learn:

- Refine their clinical practice during their internships by self-evaluation within their daily journal writing.

Course Description

Students are assigned to two or more dental offices in the community. 300 hours of hands-on experience includes chairside assisting, office management, laboratory techniques and expanded functions. A majority (over 50%) of internship hours must be completed in a general practice and the additional hours can be in a specialty practice. In addition, each student must also observe for four hours in each of the following: endodontics, oral surgery, orthodontics and periodontics. This course includes 6 hours of internship meetings with the instructor and classmates. During the internship experience, students must show progression from "O" (observed) to "W" (with assistance) to "A" (assisted alone) on their journal entries. Group 2 course.
